REVIEW OF THE YEAR STAFFING

During the 2017 - 2018 school year, we welcomed Miss E. Skillen to the staff to cover Mrs L. English's maternity leave. Mrs Fraser was employed in a temporary capacity as classroom assistant. We thank both ladies for their valuable contribution to school life and we wish them well in the future.

PUPIL ENROLMENT AND ATTENDANCE RATE

In September 2017, 12 pupils were admitted to Y1 and this brought our enrolment number to 85 pupils. The annual pupil attendance rate for 2017/18 was 92.4%. The Governors acknowledges the valuable role of the parent in ensuring that their child attends regularly and is punctual for lessons.

SCHOOL LEAVERS

During the 2017 - 2018 we continued to develop close links with our local post primary schools to ensure information was shared and transitions was a positive experience for our pupils. This year, twenty-one pupils transferred to post primary education at the end of the 2017-2018 school year. 8 to St Mark's High School; 5 to Newry High School, 4 to St Louis Grammar School; 1 to Our Lady's Grammar, 1 to Newbridge Integrated, 1 to St Mary's High School and 1 to Kilkeel High School.

THE CURRICULUM

The governors are confident that Dromore Road Primary School continues to ensure a safe, secure and stimulating learning environment. Staff expertise and resources are well utilised to assist each child as they strive to reach their maximum potential and the school offers a great variety of learning opportunities suitable to the needs of each pupil. Despite reduced government and EA finance, the staff continued to avail of opportunities for continuing professional development and this has ensured they are kept up to date with the on-going changes and developments within education.

During 2017/18 considerable work was carried out in the area of problem solving in numeracy and raising standards in spelling. Accelerated Reader was also developed further to support the development of pupils' comprehensions skills.

The school recognises the need to prepare pupils for an ever-evolving world and in doing all pupils' ICT skills were developed through a focus on the desirable features of music and sound, interactive design and film and animation. 16 new iPads were purchased and all staff availed of AMMA training. As part of the Shared Education programme, the expertise of the AMMA centre was also used to support lessons and develop staffs' ICT knowledge and skills.

Aspects of these areas featured in teachers' professional development through the "Performance Review and Staff Development" (PRSD) scheme. These initiatives were achieved in directed time, after school and on non-contact 'School Development Days'.

SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT PLAN

In line with their statutory requirements the Board of Governors consulted with all stakeholders in Term 3. Questionnaires were available for all parents to record their opinions and ways in which they felt the school could be improved. Using this data, a range of other self-evaluative data, the school has set targets to ensure school improvement in line with the DENI initiative.

POLICIES

The staff, in consultation with pupils, parents and governors, have produced a wide range of pastoral care and curriculum policies that are suited to the needs of current legislation, good practice and the NI curriculum. Last year the Admission Policy, Accessibility Plan, Code of Conduct for Employees, Teaching and Learning Policy, Complaints Procedure, Curriculum Policy, E-Safety, Health and Safety and Pastoral Care were all reviewed and amended as necessary. All other policies may be obtained from the school.

ASSESSMENT OUTCOMES OF PUPILS DURING SCHOOL YEAR 2017/18

One of the most significant aspects of the Education Reform Order has been the introduction of statutory assessment for all children in primary schools at the end of Key Stage 1 (P4) and the end of Key Stage 2 (P7). In June 2018, all P4 and P7 pupils in Dromore Road Primary School, were given a 'level' in Using Communication, Using Mathematics and ICT. Unfortunately, due to an on-going dispute over Assessment in Primary Schools, Teacher Unions have recommended that schools do not report levels to the Department of Education and as over 80% of schools did not submit key stage levels in 2017/18 it makes any comparison of data difficult and unreliable. In Dromore Road, pupils' individual levels were reported to parents with their June school reports. The overall school results for Dromore Road were as follows:

SPECIAL NEEDS

It is an aim of Dromore Road Primary School to ensure that every child, regardless of ability, has access to a broad and balanced curriculum - this, of course, includes children with special educational needs.

In order to make appropriate provision for these children Dromore Road School will follow the stages laid down in the Code of Practice as outlined in the Education (Northern Ireland) Order 1996, together with statutes laid down in the Special Educational Needs and Disability Order (2005).

Our Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO), class teachers and classroom assistants work closely together to ensure early identification of special needs, targeted programmes of work and deployment of external agencies if appropriate.

SCHOOL LIAISON

Links between the school and parents and the school and the community continue to be fostered and encouraged in various ways.

All new P1 pupils together with their parents visited the school prior to admission, in order to meet their teacher and view the classroom.

Information regarding the school's policies, practices and procedures was also shared with new parents in the form of an information booklet.

The school website was maintained and developed to help keep parents up to date with happenings in school. Letters were sent out by the Principal and teachers.

Formal parent/teacher interviews were held in October with a second interview offered in February. A written school report was issued in June. Transfer meetings were also offered to support pupils transferring to Post-Primary schools.

Liaison continued between Dromore Road and the various post-primary schools in the district. Pupils attended Open Days at the various post-primary schools and representatives from St Mark's High School, Kilkeel High School, St Louis Grammar School and Newry High School visited or communicated with the school to liaise about

transferring P7s. In addition, links continued with post primary schools and further education colleges when students from these establishments spent time on work experience in Dromore Road.

Local ministers continued to participate in school assemblies and provided denominational RE for relevant pupils. This added significantly to the spiritual dimension of the school.

The school is extremely fortunate to continue to have such a hard-working and dedicated Parent Teacher Association who continue to work together to raise funds for our school through a variety of fundraising events including the Autumn Fayre, Christmas Hamper, International Food Event, Smartie tubes and Sponsored Walk and BBQ.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Dromore Road Primary School has a well-deserved reputation for extensive extracurricular provision. The teachers run clubs throughout the year and these are normally full to capacity. Last year the pupils were also able to avail of a range of clubs organised by external coaching providers. During the 2017/18 year, we continued to develop our after school provision for pupils in P4-7 and pupils were able to avail of the following clubs.

EXTENDED SCHOOLS

Dromore Road is very fortunate to be able to offer a number of activities through 'The Extended Schools' programme. All the programmes funded through this programme aim to promote:

- · Being Healthy
- Enjoying Learning and Achieving
- · Living in Safety and with Stability
- Enjoying Economic and Environmental Well-Being
- Contributing Positively to Community and Society

The school was able to offer a daily 321 Club to facilitate younger pupils in P1-3 to be engaged in a range of exciting activities between 1:30-2:50pm. We also used extended school funding to provide additional after school activities and to fund our Accelerated Reader Programme.

As part of our involvement in the Extended Schools cluster, with the other schools in the area, a group of P6/7 work collaboratively to produce an anti-bullying DVD. St Mark's also hosted a number of workshops to promote pupils' health and wellbeing including clay and cookery.

SHARED EDUCATION

Our school reflects the mix of denominations in society and we try to forward this policy at any opportunity. The school proactively develops links with other schools in the area and Dromore Road has a long history of working alongside St Bronagh's Primary School in Rostrevor. We value the relationship between the two schools and pupils regularly have shared lessons together. During 2017/18 our shared lessons with St Bronagh's focused on using Numicon to enhance the teaching of Shape and Space. Classes also availed of the support from the AMMA centre in developing the use of iPad apps to support learning in Numeracy.

PUPIL COUNCIL

Pupil Council members for 2017-2018 school year were: Josh Cowan, Kirsty Knox, Ashley Bedzeti, Rainers Mikson, Keita Tetere and Amber Hughes.

Regular meetings were held with Mrs K. Graham to discuss school matters which the children in school have put forward. The pupils collaborated with the PTA to purchase new outside play equipment for each class and with Mrs Graham to suggest appropriate Accelerated Reader prizes. School Council also organised a number of fund raising events including Jump Heart and a school Talent Show. They kindly reported about school life to the Board of Governors in April 2018.

ECO COUNCIL

The Eco Council is made up of elected pupils from throughout the whole school with an interest in the environment and last year 8 pupils acted as Eco Warriors. The children in our Eco Council have made many positive changes to our school environment and this year have continued to focus on Biodiversity, Recycling and Global Prospective. During 2017/18 they have been particularly proactive in improving the effectiveness of recycling by completing a number of recycling workshops, organising competitions and availing of craft workshops run by Newry and Mourne's Environment Education Officer. They organised a Dapper day to raise money for Cancer Research and hosted an international food event in collaboration with our PTA. We presented to St. Bronagh's and shared good practice and also participated in a number of eco related community projects, e.g. planting at the harbour.

The Eco Council was also proactive in maintain and enhancing our school grounds and all their hard work paid off when we received a special recommendation in the Best Kept School Competition.

SCHOOL SPORT

1996 regulations require formal information to be presented regarding school sport. The aims for school sport as outlined in the school prospectus are fulfilled through physical education curriculum time, together with an extensive range of extracurricular sport.

Children are timetabled for PE below and activities include athletics, dance, gymnastics and games:-

- $P1/3 2 \times 30-40$ min sessions per week
- $P4/7 2 \times 40-50$ min sessions per week

This year we were able to again avail of the IFA's School Sports Programme and pupils benefitted from Miss Rea's expertise in developing pupils' fundamental skills. Children from P4 to P7 also participated in an annual 10 week swimming programme at Kilkeel Leisure Centre.

The school offers sporting as part of the PE curriculum and after school activities. Sports available at Dromore Road Primary School are athletics, gymnastics, hip-hop

dancing, cycling proficiency, dodgeball, football, hockey, netball, tennis and other games.

Throughout the year, we also implemented the "daily mile" scheme to improve the health and concentration of pupils.

SCHOOL SECURITY

1998 regulations require formal information to be presented regarding school security. Please note the following:

- 1) Visitor access control during school hours all visitors to school must enter by the front door and report to reception. The front door is protected by an electronic access control. A closed circuit television system operates on school premises.
- 2) Secure doors and windows external doors are secured from the inside when pupils are in class and locked when school is not in use. Double glazed windows are fitted with safety / security handles.
- 3) Out of hour's access there are three keyholders Building Supervisor, Secretary and Principal.
- 4) Fire Detection Systems the school is fitted with a fully functional fire alarm.
- 5) Cash handling a safe is installed in school for this purpose.
- 6) Computer security information held on computer can only be accessed by using confidential passwords. A "Safe Use of the Internet" policy operates in school.
- 7) Intruder Alarm the school is protected by an intruder alarm.
 An assessment is carried out annually by the Board of Governors and forwarded to the EA.

Regular updates are given to the BoG at every meeting and all staff received training in October 2017. The BoG endorse that Dromore Road Primary reflects the safeguarding guidance set out by the Department of Education and impacts positively on learning, teaching and outcomes.

A safeguarding ethos permeates the school environment and there is a Child Protection noticeboard in the main corridor and posters displayed in classrooms, resource areas, entrance hall and outside noticeboards which provides advice and displays child helpline numbers. All classes have Worry and Suggestion boxes and there is a You Share, We Care box placed centrally in the school.

Throughout the school year, the staff have implemented a range of preventative activities to ensure the welfare and care of pupils is central to life at Dromore Road. There included:

- Regular circle time and activities from CCEA's PD&MU Living Together boxes were implemented to raise discussion with the pupils about health, wellbeing, relationships and personal safety.
- Members of the Safeguarding team lead assemblies on topics such as Who to talk
 to if they're worried, Stranger Danger, Be Safe Be Seen, Fire Evacuation Procedures,
 Road Safety etc. Local ministers also contribute to the children's moral and spiritual
 development and pupils are provided with opportunities to take part in class assemblies.
- School visitors, trips and events, e.g. NSPCC, fire fighters, PSNI, CASSE, Love for Life, In the Net play, Farm Safety talk, Cancer Research, EWO Moving Up, PTA Cultural Food event were all used to develop pupils knowledge of how to keep themselves safe.
- E-safety was developed through the use of PSNI officers and as part of the CASSE programme. P5/6 pupils also attended the 'In the Net' play.
- Anti-bullying week and Internet Safety Day featured on the school calendar and each class planned age appropriate activities to raise awareness.
- Some classes participated in Relax Kids sessions. These sessions promoted wellbeing and resilience.
- All pupils were involved in Shared Education lessons. Opportunities were planned to promote tolerance and respect among pupils.
- P7 pupils are trained in basic lifesaving skills through the HeartStart programme.
- KS2 pupils completed their cycling proficiency training.

SCHOOL PREMISES

The Governors, with the assistance of the EA Architects and Maintenance Departments continued to maintain the school building and grounds.
